As a school we congratulate former Year 11 pupils on their fantastic GCSE Results achieved in the summer! Once again it has been clear that it is the level of 'effort' that pupils put in that determines the outcomes that they achieve. At Holy Trinity, staff frequently use the following phrase in their interactions with pupils: ***Effort beats talent, unless talent works hard***. From a school perspective, we are very pleased that overall levels of attainment and pupil progress have improved since our previous set of results in 2023.

We still look back with enormous pride following *Ofsted* inspection that took place just over a year ago (September 2023). In amongst an exceptional report, were these following evaluations about our school:

Curriculum Update: Mrs Henvey

As we approach the midpoint of this half-term, I would like to take this opportunity to update you on both our curriculum developments and some exciting extra-curricular opportunities at school.

Firstly, I am delighted to report that Year 10 students have made a fantastic start to their options, with a record number of Humanities and Spanish groups this year. This means more students than ever before are on track to achieve the English Baccalaureate (EBacc), giving them a solid academic foundation for their future studies. Year 7 have settled in very well and following completion of their CATs tests, we will be looking to re-set them at the beginning of October.

Year 11 Enterprise and Marketing students had the opportunity to visit *Cadbury World* recently, gaining valuable insights into real-world business and marketing strategies. Additionally, our Chaplaincy Team visited *Oscott College*, further enriching their spiritual development, while *Front Line History* brought an engaging day of historical learning to the school, captivating our students with hands-on activities.

Looking ahead, we have exciting trips lined up, including a Year 8 visit to the *Tower of London* planned for October and the highly anticipated Barcelona trip, involving 40 staff and students, is now just under two weeks away! This is a wonderful opportunity for our students to immerse themselves in a new culture and further their learning in a global context.

Our *Girls Network* is also now fully established, providing our young women with mentoring opportunities and support. The Drayton Manor Rewards Trip is also fast approaching, and we are sure it will be a fun and well-deserved break for those students who worked particularly hard last academic year.

In terms of homework, we are making huge strides towards ensuring that all pupils are using the student portal. This is where all homework will be recorded by staff, and we really believe that it will help our students develop independence and accountability for their learning. We are a homework school because we know that good homework habits will lead to improved outcomes and results for all our pupils, so please encourage your child to log in daily and keep on top of their homework!

Lastly, we are now ready to announce our full extra-curricular offer for this term. Please check our website for the latest update and watch out for a text from school with more information. Our staff dedicate their time to running these activities, and we strongly encourage all students to get involved. There is truly something for everyone!

Students have been so eager to be back in the classroom and are building fantastic relationships with their new teachers and peers; the transition has been seamless. Many students have commented on their joy to be back. They missed Holy Trinity over the summer holiday and are ready to commit to their new challenges because they 'love to learn' at Holy Trinity.

Year 11 Citizenship - 'Pre-love uniform shop'!

As part of their 'Citizenship in Action' GCSE examination project, Year 11 Citizenship pupils are planning to organise a 'Pre-love' uniform shop to support pupils and families in the current challenging economic times. Pupils are looking to collect Holy Trinity uniform items including PE kit, still in good condition (age 14 - 16), that are no longer being used and are simply being stored in household wardrobes or cupboards. Pupil Progress update: Mrs Pritchard & Mr Woolgar:

Mrs Pritchard (Assistant Headteacher):

On Thursday 22nd August we welcomed our Year 11 leavers back into the school hall to collect their GCSE exam results. Watching pupils open their envelopes, alongside many members of staff made for a very special morning. Students were thrilled with their results, with many students getting into their colleges of choice. As a school, we were pleased to see an improvement in attainment and progress in many subject areas. Witnessing so many smiling faces on results morning is testament to the hard work of both pupils and staff over the last five years. Congratulations to our wonderful Year 11 leaver's cohort for a fantastic set of results!

As we look forward to this academic year, all year groups have made a positive start to the year. Year 11 have already attended revision and study skills workshops and parents have been invited into Information Evening, allowing us to share key advice and support tips with parents. Senior members of staff have met with the Year 11 cohort individually to discuss and reflect their progress in Year 10 and have spoken about how each student can be best supported as they journey through Year 11. A great start so far!

Mr Woolgar (Associate Assistant Headteacher):

The week beginning 14th October we have 25 Year 11 pupils taking part in *MyTutor* tutoring, where each will receive extra input of 1 hour a week for 10 weeks in either English or Maths. This is to support them in the lead up to the mock exams as well as the summer exams. We continue to support our *Early Careers Teachers* (ECT) - we now have 2 colleagues in Year 1 and 2 colleagues in Year 2, completing their full training and induction requirements. We will once again be having some mentoring from the *Princes Trust* to develop and enhance pupil resilience and motivation, as well as supporting in potential career paths in the future.

Extra tuition will again be fully in place for Year 11 after the January mock exam series, and available for smaller numbers of pupils before this, as part of a bespoke programme to support different groups of pupils. Extra tuition has been successful in recent years in giving pupils structured revision support to be successful in their exams.

At the heart of our school ethos are the core values of 'Respect' and 'Equality'. Being made in God's image we 'Learn to love and love to learn' in order to be the best we can be and to affect positively the lives of others and society in general. We are creating the next generation of pupils who are leaders, who know right from wrong and are able to develop a clear sense of responsibility and morale purpose in their decisions and actions- those who can work hard to foster a strong sense of social justice; to improve both their own opportunities and quality of life as well as that of others. We are proud to have been awarded very recently the *Rights Respecting Gold School Award*. We remind our parents and carers that if they have any concerns around the safety of their children in school to contact either your child's Head of Year or a member of the Designated Safeguarding Team (DSL team). Developing and understanding risks of the online world and Promoting Civil Online Behaviour.

We would like to remind parents and carers of the importance of monitoring the digital usage of their children. This includes usage of the internet and social media usage. This will involve looking at what their children are accessing and using and how they are using social media when at home as well as during the school day if phones are brought into school. The school curriculum focusses carefully on teaching children about online safety and the importance of 'digital civility' and appropriate and safe behaviours. Complemented with close parental monitoring and supervision, this supports safe social media and internet usage outside of school. On our school website, there are several resources to support parents and carers with understanding how they can keep their children safe in this digital age. School works with a variety of agencies to support and educate our pupils around safe and socially acceptable behaviours including ensuring that they understand the law and we always welcome the support of our school link police officers as they support us with this.

There is never any excuse for any behaviour, which might be verbally threatening, abusive or intimidating on or offline. All children have the right to be safe inside and outside of school. At the heart of our school ethos are the core values of 'Respect' and 'Equality'. Being made in God's image we should 'Learn to love and love to learn' in order to be the best we can be and to affect positively the lives of others and society in general. A reminder of our High Standards and Expectations:

A series of 'Standards Checks' over the last couple of weeks have shown that standards are back to their highest level as they were in September 2023 when the school received 'Outstanding' Ofsted judgements for Behaviour and Attitudes and Personal Development. It is imperative that these high standards are maintained throughout the year.

Standards reminder:

- Pupils must have a blazer, tie and shirts to be tucked in at all times.
- Pupils must wear plain black footwear without any coloured logos/laces.
- Pupils will no longer be permitted to arrive to school in their PE Kits, they will have access to specialist Sports Hall facilities for changing.
- Pupils must have an appropriate pencil case containing essential items such as:
 - black/blue pen
 - green pen
 - pencil
 - ruler
 - rubber
- Punctuality to form time and lessons must be excellent.
- PE kit must be in line with our Uniform Policy, there should be no branding on kits as they must be plain.
- Hoodies are not permitted to be worn, all coats/jackets must be worn on top of blazers.
- Jackets/coats must be plain with no large branding, denim jackets and gilets are not permitted to be worn in School.
- One small set of plain metal stud earrings are acceptable for all pupils but all other piercings and jewellery must be removed.
- Hairstyles should be practical, clean and safe. Tramlines, or patterns shaved into hair or eyebrows is not permitted. Extreme hair colours are not permitted.
- During the winter, it is essential that your child wears a suitable waterproof coat for school. As stated, hoodies are not permitted and should not be worn in place of a suitable outdoor coat. Balaclavas, ski masks, snoods and comparable items of clothing are not permitted. Items will be confiscated if they are seen in school.
- Pupils must be highly organised ensuring homework and other tasks are completed on time when set by their teachers.
- In line with our annual practice, this existing Uniform Policy, is to be reviewed with school stakeholders during the summer term in anticipation of next Academic Year.

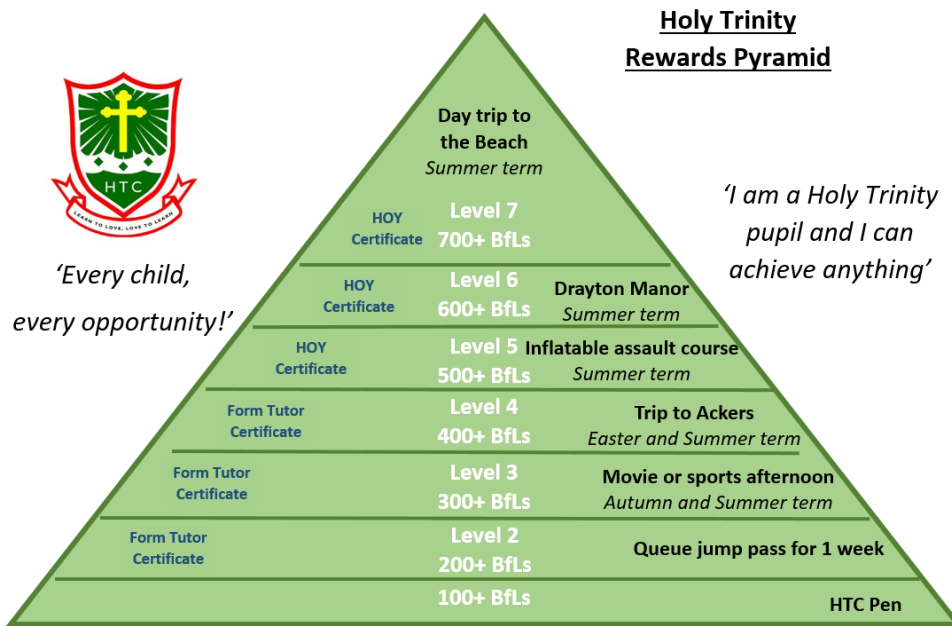
